

Berry Nice!

Here in the panhandle, strawberry season is the sweetest time of the year! Picking is already happening at our local farms, and the crops are sweeter than ever. Why are the berries extra delicious this year?

Some may wonder if the snowfall damaged the plants, leaving a smaller crop and causing a sweeter flavor in the remaining berries. Jennifer Bearden, Okaloosa Ag Agent, says we were lucky here; normally, temperatures in the teens would kill the plants. However, the unusual snowfall we had blanketed and protected the plants with insulation, so we should have plenty of sweet berries.

Bearden says that due to a disease outbreak at the typical supplier's nursery, local farms had to find a new source for plants. The new supplier is distributing a new, sweeter-tasting variety developed by the University of Florida. In fact, Bearden has said they are "some of the best flavor-wise I've ever had."

In addition to being a delicious snack or part of a meal, strawberries are also exceptional in nutritional value. One cup of strawberries contains only about 50 calories and just ½ gram of fat, is low in sugar, and is packed with vitamin C. It also contains fiber, essential minerals like potassium and magnesium to keep your body functioning correctly, and antioxidants that can protect the body from damage that may lead to heart disease, stroke, cancer, and diabetes. According to the Mayo Clinic, Allie Wergin, RD, "Current research suggests that consuming 1 cup of strawberries may help improve heart health by reducing total cholesterol levels and lowering blood pressure, reduce the risk of some cancers, have anti-inflammatory effects, and support cognitive function (source: https://www.mayoclinichealthsystem.org/hometown-health/speaking-of-health/strawberries-a-nutrient-powerhouse."



- · Wash the strawberries and snack on them fresh,
- Top low-fat yogurt, pancakes, or low-sugar cereal with sliced strawberries and other toppings,
- · Combine with your favorite fruits and low-fat milk or yogurt into a smoothie,
- Chop other fruits and create a fruit kabob or fruit cup,
- · Quarter and add to a green salad.

Whether you are looking for a family outing or ready to prep some for the freezer, this year's berries will be a surefire hit! 
May 6 - Meeting Notes
